MESSAGE FROM MRS FREEMAN



Dear Parents and Carers,

My sincere apologies to parents and carers of 4B and Mrs Buchanan for having to postpone their class assembly this week. This is never a decision that I take lightly and very much hope to be in a position to announce a new assembly date soon.

Despite the government's announcement to move to Plan A, we are unfortunately not yet able to lift the current restrictions that we have in place in school. The restrictions will remain in place for one more week, at which time I will review the number of COVID cases across the school. We hope to be in a position to return to normality in the week beginning 7th February but more information will follow at the end of next week.

YEAR 2 Materials







This half term Year 2 have been learning about Materials in our Science lessons. Did you know the word "material" does not mean the same thing as "fabric"?

Although many people get these two words confused we now know that the word "Material" is a classification, meaning "what things are made from"! Some examples of materials are: fabric, metal, wood and plastic.

We have begun to learn about natural and man made materials as well as sustainability/recycling and which materials are kind to our planet and which should be avoided and why.

Last Friday we spent our Buzz Day in Forest School using a variety of materials such as fabric, paper, plastic, wood and natural materials already in the area such as mud, sticks and leaves to try and build a shelter, which could fit 6 children inside AND was waterproof.

We worked in teams to design and build our shelters and once they were complete we climbed inside while our adults poured (warm) water over the roof!

We learned that paper is not a waterproof material as it is fragile and tears easily and also absorbs water. This led to some of us getting wet! We decided that plastic was the most waterproof material as the water was able to just slide off, meaning we stayed dry.

The worst material to use was fabric. Not only did this absorb water but it held on to it and dripped on us for some time! It also became very heavy and fell from where we had fixed it on the roof.

There were other variables which determined whether we would get wet, such as leaving gaps in the ceiling but overall we were able to think critically about each type of material and its suitability as a waterproof shelter-material!

Reading at Home
