WHAT IS THE SEN REGISTER AND HOW DOES IT WORK?

The SEN register is a document held by all schools, outlining which children may need additional support above that of their usual classroom teaching. In order for a child to be placed on the SEN register, they need to meet the criteria of needing support which is 'in addition to or different from' that of their peers, as outlined in the SEN Code of Practice, across one or more of the broad areas of SEN - Cognition and Learning, Communication and Interaction, Physical and Sensory or Social, Emotional and Mental Health. To identify which children may need support in addition to or different from that of their peers, we use a variety of approaches including; observations, book looks and meetings with parents and/or class teachers. Further information about this can be found in our <u>SEN Information Report</u>. Once a decision has been made to place a child on the SEN register, they will be allocated a code which shows the level of support required. This is either - SEN Support (K1 - 4), Pupil Resource Agreement or Education (PRA), Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

What do these codes mean?

K, PRA and EHCP are codes to identify the level of need and support required for a child on the SEN register.

K1-K3 (SEN Support): A level of need has been identified and this should be met through quality first teaching, reasonable adjustments and interventions or provisions within school.

K4 (SEN Support): Needs have been identified and external agencies are involved to advise school on the best support strategies.

PRA: Needs can not be met within the notional budget or external agencies have made recommendations for further support outside of quality first teaching and intervention. PRAs may provide extra funding if the Local Authority Panel agree. More information: Pupil Resource Agreements.

EHCP: Children with an Education, Health and Care Plan have needs which have been identified as complex and long term. More information: Education, Health and Care Plans

It is important to remember that the SEN Register is a fluid document which is regularly analysed, evaluated and updated. Some children may be on the SEN register throughout their school journey whereas others may be removed.

Having your child on the SEN register may seem daunting and it can be an emotional experience, however it is definitely not a negative one! It is a fantastic way to ensure that your child is receiving the best support and that every adult involved with your child's education is aware of how to provide the most positive experience for them whilst at school.

HOW WILL I BE INFORMED AND KEPT UP TO DATE WITH INFORMATION ABOUT MY CHILD?

Any initial concerns will be brought to your attention by your child's class teacher. Even with involvement from the inclusion team, your child's class teacher is the person who spends the most time with them and therefore knows them best! Following this discussion, you will be invited to meet with the inclusion team to discuss any concerns or worries you may have and to put a plan in place together to reflect what is best for your child. This may include short or long term interventions or a change to provision within school. It may include adaptations to the way your child is taught in the classroom or potentially a referral to external agencies. Any decisions made or information which is shared will be uploaded to our SEN software named Edukey and you will receive login information which will allow you to view all information such as support plans and interventions and also to add your comments and points of view.

What can I expect to receive at the start of this year?

As you know we have been giving our inclusion department a big overhaul over the last academic year. This includes starting afresh with the SEN register, interventions, the environment and many other things behind the scenes!

We are starting with the SEN register. The Inclusion Team and I have carefully reflected on who is on our SEN register, why they are on there and whether or not they will remain part of it. We shall be sending letters to the parents of those children who are on the register to explain why and the current provision in place. If you receive one of these letters and would like more information via a meeting or telephone call, either myself, Mrs Sargeant or Miss Knott will be available to meet with you. Please do not panic if you receive a letter - we are only a phone call away.

You may also receive information regarding interventions and provisions in place to support your child and this will come with an Edukey login. Please remember that not all children who are taking part in interventions will be on the SEN register.
