EQUALITY AND DIVERSITY AT BHPS Miss O'Mahony, Wider Curriculum and Equality and Diversity Lead

At BHPS, we strive to ensure that equality and diversity are woven throughout our curriculum and embedded in everyday life for our pupils. Our aim is to ensure our pupils are educated on the abundance of cultures, religions, customs and traditions from across the world so that they can appreciate the rich diversity of both Great Britain and the wider world.

Equality and Diversity in the Curriculum *Literacy*

Diversity in children's literature is incredibly important. There is an expression that describes children's books as being both mirrors and windows in the world of a child's mind and imagination. It's vital that children and young people see themselves and each other in the books they read as well as giving children a chance to learn about someone else's life and imagine themselves in another's shoes.

At Biggin Hill Primary, we try to follow this ethos and give our children a wide range of books to enjoy. We follow a whole-book approach for our Literacy curriculum and use the Literacy Tree as the basis for our planning. Each Year Group reads a variety of books containing a range of characters and settings from classics tales to more modern stories. In KS2, children read The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe as well as, Hidden Figures by Margot Lee Shetterly. This is the story of a team of female African-American mathematicians who served a vital role in NASA during the early years of the U.S. space program.

Representation in children's books for all children is improving all the time and so we are able to make sure we choose books and authors that reflect the world we live in, from different ethnicities to blended families, physical and mental health challenges, neurodiversity and the many other ways in which children are different. For example, Reception children have enjoyed reading The Great Big Book of Families by Mary Hoffman.

Every year, we evaluate our book choices and for the first time this year, Year 6 read Suffragette - the battle for equality by David Roberts which charts the suffragist movement – from aristocrats to the middle and working class as well as a look at the global struggle for universal suffrage. We are constantly updating our book lists to ensure we have a balance of books which reflect our school community as well as showing us lives outside our own.

The Travelling Showman

Showman families are residents of the community and they have been there for generations. There are approx 5000 Showman families, who travel the UK with their funfairs and have done so for generations, carrying on the family business! These family businesses have passed from father to son and many are 5th/6th generation.

For generations, Showman have helped to shape towns and cities, entertainment and sport into what they are today. The Fairground Community served their country in both World Wars and the Showman's Guild of Great Britain helped raise funds for ambulances in WWI. They bought a Spitfire plane in WWII and named it, '*The Fun of the Fair'*. This is documented at the Biggin Hill Memorial Museum.





Traditionally, Showmen have been misrepresented and misunderstood. 'The Show Must Go On' is a fantastic book which shines a rare spotlight on the travelling Showman community.

YEAR 3

Time

Year 3 have been doing lots of work on time in maths. We started by checking we knew

the months of the year and we learnt a rhyme to remember how many days there are in each month. We learned about why February is special and what a leap year is. We timed each other doing different PE activities and learnt how to compare and order times. We have been recapping our work on time from previous years and are now starting to tell the time to the nearest minute.

In literacy we have been reading "Leon And The Place Between". We have learnt how to draw a story map to show the key events in a story and the difference between concrete and abstract nouns. We have begun to use adverbial phrases at the start of our sentences to say how/where/when something happened.

In history we have been learning about the Ancient Greeks. We have found Greece on a map and looked at graphs to compare the climate in Greece with the climate in England. We have found out all about different gods and goddesses and read some Greek myths like Theseus and the Minotaur. We have learnt about what the Ancient Greek Olympics were like and written in role, pretending that we have competed.
